CHILDREN CANCER FOUNDATION

he Okapi Children Cancer Foundation (OCCF) is a Non-Governmental Organization founded in 2017 by likeminded friends passionate about humanitarian causes.

Formerly known as Friends for a Cause, the organization underwent a name change in 2018 and was officially registered as a Non-profit/Non-Governmental Organization with the Corporate Affairs Commission of Nigeria in September 2019 (CAC/IT/NO 135583).

The Foundation was inspired by the life of **Tunde Ogungbayi** who was popularly known as OKAPI. Tunde was born in 1966 and studied Accounting in the University of Ife (now Obafemi Awolowo University). He was diagnosed with Cancer in 2016 and sadly passed on to glory in May 2017. He was a devoted father, husband, brother, son, friend, and colleague. Everyone who knew him would testify to his love for children, fitness, and healthy eating. He ran four (4) marathons and was a triathlete.

The Foundation has been set up to assist children battling cancer and be a formidable voice in the childhood cancer advocacy sphere. Without reference to religion or ethnic affiliations, OCCF supports children receiving treatment in the following hospitals:

- National Hospital Abuja
- University of Abuja Teaching Hospital Gwagwalada
- Federal Medical Centre, Abuja (Jabi)

Over the period in which the Foundation has been operational, it has intervened in over 200 cases of children receiving treatment for different types of Cancer. Some of these Children are survivors of Cancer following her intervention and are now living normal healthy lives.

With your support OCCF hopes to extend her reach to save more Nigerian children.

FUND CHILDHOOD CANCER TREATMENT

OkapiCCF allocates resources to fund medical treatments for children diagnosed with cancer.

This encompasses costs related to chemotherapy, surgeries, medications, and other essential medical procedures required for the treatment and recovery of the champs.



ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

We recognizes the toll childhood cancer takes on families and aims to contribute to the economic well-being of families dealing with the disease in a bid to provide financial stability during and after the treatment process.



CAPACITY BUILDING

OkapiCCF invests in the development of healthcare professionals, caregivers, and communities involved in the care of children with cancer.

Capacity building initiatives may include training programs, workshops, and educational campaigns aimed at enhancing knowledge and skills related to Pediatric oncology.



AWARENESS/ADVOCACY/ SENSITIZATION

OkapiCCF actively engages in awareness, advocacy, and sensitization efforts to promote understanding and early detection of childhood cancer in communities and organised groups



PSYCHOLOGICAL SUPPORT

Recognizing the emotional toll that cancer takes on children and their families, the Foundation provides psychological support services.

This involves counseling, support groups, and other mental health resources to help children and their families cope with the challenges associated with cancer diagnosis and treatment.

- 4 Most childhood cancers can be cured with generic medicines and other forms of treatment, including surgery and radiotherapy.

Childhood cancer cannot generally be prevented or identified through screening.

Avoidable deaths from childhood cancers in LMICs result from lack of diagnosis, misdiagnosis or delayed diagnosis, obstacles to accessing care, abandonment of treatment, death from toxicity, and relapse.

5 Treatment of childhood cancer is expensive in all income settings.

Each year, an estimated 400 000 children and adolescents of 0-19 year olds develop cancer.


The most common types of childhood cancers are leukemias, brain cancers, lymphomas and solid tumours, such as neuroblastoma and Wilms tumours.

In high-income countries, where comprehensive services are generally accessible, more than 80% of children with cancer are cured. In low- and middle-income countries (LMICs), less than 30% are cured.

Childhood cancer data records are needed to drive continuous improvements in the quality of care, and to inform policy decisions.







kapiCCF introduced the FCT School sensitization program in 2023 which is aimed at educating school age children on childhood cancer in a bid to:

- reduce the stigmatization associated with childhood cancer
- reduce incidences of education abandonment for childhood cancer survivors
- Increase awareness on childhood cancer among school age children
- Increase early detection of childhood cancer

120% average percentage increase in awareness post sensitization exercise
